6. Content

Qualitative study reviewing the social, emotional and psychological experiences of 69 children born of girls abducted by the rebels of the Lord's Resistance Army during the 20-year old Northern Uganda war. The study, carried out in the northern Ugandan town of Gulu used both observation and interview techniques to gather data from the children, their mothers and community including traditional system of the Acholi people.

7. Population and sampling procedure

Purposive sampling was key strategy for selection of respondents partly due to its flexibility in unstable situations such as that in Gulu then. Studies were carried out where children born of war could be located including internally displaced persons camps, reception centres as well as amongst communities in ordinary settlements. A total of 84 children (67 born of the LRA and 17 born in normal relationships as control)

8. Method

Questionnaires were developed, tailored for members of each focal group – children born in captivity and control group, their mothers, families of their mothers, community members, NGOs (& reception centres) and traditional leaders. These questionnaires were administered directly by the data collectors for technical reasons which included illiteracy, unstable security and the short period of time allotted by the researcher for data collection. The data collectors also applied skills in observation, which proved very helpful for assessing physical evidences of exposure to vulnerabilities as well as psychosocial as detailed in the findings.
